Now what?

- So... you've picked a topic. Now what?
- This is where many students get stuck. How do you convert your thoughts to a well-organized essay?
- The answer: Pre-Writing

Pre-Writing: Brainstorming

- You need to know <u>where</u> you are going in your paper, and <u>how</u> to get there.
- Collect your thoughts and ideas, then organize them.
- There are several ways to brainstorm. The most effective way varies by person.

Brainstorming Strategy #1: Listing


- 1. Set a timer for 5 minutes.
- 2. Write down every idea you have.
- 3. List until timer goes off.

- Look for patterns of thoughts.
- Cross out useless or irrelevant material.
- Next step: Group the remaining items into categories.

Brainstorming Strategy #2: Clustering

- Set a timer for 5 minutes.
- 2. Start with the middle circle and write your topic.
- 3. Branch out to other related ideas.

This strategy works well with visual learners.



Brainstorming Strategy #3: Baby Outline

- 1. Set a timer for 5 minutes.
- 2. Convert your cluster to an outline.

- I. Introduction
- II. Background information about the series
- III. Voldemort
 - A. Snake
 - B. Murderer
 - C. Harry's parents
- IV. Lucius Malfoy
 - A. Wealthy
 - B. Loyalty
 - C. Parent
- V. Wormtail
 - A. Rat
 - B. Coward
 - C. Traitor
- VI. Conclusion

Example of Baby Outline

Pre-Writing: Outline

- After brainstorming, gather your notes and begin writing an outline.
- Outlining is the key to a good paper.
- The outline is the skeleton of your paper and provides the organization.
- The outline ensures that your paper actually gets where you want to go.
- START WHEREVER YOU WANT TO (but don't stray far from the thesis)
